From the desk of Rabbi Asch

Fall is in the air! As I write this the days have turned cooler, a sure sign that the High Holidays are almost here. This month is a time of reflection and introspection--of preparation for the holidays. This year, our preparations at the Temple have looked a little bit different. The yizkor book is already at the printers, we are numbering *machzorim* to lend out and investing in video cameras and microphones. Some things will also look the same. We will still prepare by cooking our favorite holiday foods, calling to wish friends a *shana tova* and hearing the sound of the shofar in Elul.

Part of our preparation each year is internal. We examine our actions so that we are not caught by surprise when the holidays come. Traditions New and Old During the High Holidays

We all know why the High Holidays this year will be different than previous years. To make sure that I will still be able to feel the *naches* (pleasure) of the holiday and observe the new year, I will do at least two things. I will double down and make more of the traditional foods I associate with Rosh Hashanah including my mom's honey cake and a side dish of Moroccan carrots. There is a tradition at Rosh Hashanah to eat symbolic foods meant to help ensure a good new year. Of course, we know about apples and honey for a sweet new year. In addition, eating carrots, especially cut into rounds or coins, are meant to symbolize increased blessings in the new year. And more often eaten in Israel than here, pomegranates, filled with seeds, are said to represent an increased multitude of virtues for us in the coming year.

I will also make the effort to go see the live shofar service in Augusta, one of three locations to hear it this year. Hearing the shofar is one of my favorite Jewish traditions. For me, it signifies, in its unique way, a separation from one year to the next. The sounding of the shofar is familiar, comforting, energizing, and filled with expectation. More than anything, hearing the shofar is how I know it is a new year, a happy ritual the High Holiday planning committee made sure to include amidst challenging circumstances.

To find some new High Holiday recipes, I highly recommend you purchase the new Temple Beth El Augusta Members and Friends Cookbook. Stacey Mondschein Katz gathered together a wonderful book of recipes provided by our community members. I plan to look for a few new dishes to make this year, especially to use the abundant produce available at this time of the year. This cookbook is also comforting, knowing many of the people who contributed recipes.

If you need another reason to get the cookbook, my mother's honey cake recipe is in it. Let me know how your version comes out!

What's happening at TBE

Ranked Choice Voting in Maine

Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) is not a new concept, although it may still feel new to many of us. RCV actually has been around in Maine since 2011 (and in New England since the late 1800s!), when Portland used RCV to elect its mayor and experienced a 40% higher than projected turnout. As we look forward to the general election on Tuesday, November 3, Mainers will be making history as the first voters to use RCV for a presidential election. This comes after RCV opponents did not turn in enough valid signatures to put a people's veto on the November 2020 election ballot.

What is RCV?

If you are new to RCV or just are not sure you fully understand how it works, here's an explanation from RCV Maine: Ranked choice voting gives you the power to rank candidates from your favorite to your least favorite. On Election Night, all the ballots are counted for voters' first choices. If one candidate receives an outright majority, he or she wins. If no one receives a majority, the candidate with the fewest first choices is eliminated and voters who liked that candidate the best have their ballots instantly counted for their second choice. This process repeats and last-place candidates lose until one candidate reaches a majority and wins. Your vote counts for your second choice only if your first choice has been eliminated.

What races use RCV?

Mainers have voted in favor of RCV twice: first, in 2016, by the second largest referendum vote of the Maine people, and second, in 2018. When it passed in 2016, ranked choice applied to races for the U.S. Senate and House, Governor, and Maine Senate and Assembly beginning in 2018.

In the upcoming 2020 General Election, RCV will be used for the U.S. House and Senate races, and the Presidential race. If you voted in the primary, you probably noticed that RCV was used for Maine General Assembly races as well, but will not be used in the General Election for those races. Requirements for those races in the primary are dictated by statute, as opposed to the General Election which is dictated by the Maine Constitution. Changes to voting in the General Election therefore would require an amendment to the Constitution. [You can do more research yourself on the Maine Ranked Choice Voting Page (https://legislature.maine.gov/lawlibrary/ranked-choice-voting-in-maine/9509). It gets somewhat confusing but if you've been reading the Talmud, you should have no problems.]

Want an absentee ballot?

If you are all set to request your absentee ballot for the General Election, you should know that you can go ahead and request it now. In fact, you could have requested it as early as August 3rd, three months before the election. Mainers can request absentee ballots electronically (https://www.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/AbsenteeBallot/index.pl) or via downloadable mail-in form (https://www.maine.gov/sos/cec/elec/upcoming/index.html).

Requests also can be made by calling your town clerk (https://www.maine.gov/sos/cec/elec/munic.html). Absentee ballots will be mailed out one month prior to the election. The ballots can be requested up to three business days before the election - by October 15 is recommended. They must be returned by election day, not postmarked by election day.
