From the desk of Rabbi Asch

I was recently asked by a community member if I travel a lot for work. My initial reaction was to say no, but upon reflection I realized that I do travel quite a bit. This past month, I attended the Biennial of the Union for Reform Judaism in Boston. In addition to hearing inspiring speakers and attending workshops on everything from leading worship to teaching tots, I went there to receive the <u>2017 Fain Award</u> on behalf of Temple Beth El. We were one of only 17 congregations across our movement to be recognized for our social action programming, specifically for our work with the Capital Area New Mainers Project.



In January, I will be travelling to Washington, D.C., with five Temple teens to take part in the <u>L'Taken Seminar</u>. We will join with others from across North America for four days of learning what Jewish values say about national issues. We will tour Washington, including the Holocaust Memorial Museum. After researching an issue, students will lobby our senators and representatives (or at least their staffs) on Capitol Hill. You'll hear more about this trip through our Facebook page, in a future newsletter, and when our teens speak at the Temple about their experiences.

I also am travelling regularly as part of my work on the board of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. It is an honor to serve and to bring the voice of small congregation rabbis to our national body. I am particularly proud of two initiatives the board is undertaking. After conducting two intensive studies, we are beginning to discuss how to address issues of isolation and stress in the rabbinate. We have also established a <u>Task Force</u> on the Experience of Women in the Rabbinate to better understand and to begin to address issues of gender bias.

This does not even include my travel around our state to meet with rabbis and congregations in Portland and Bath to talk about the <u>Center for Small Town Jewish Life</u> and our upcoming conference (mark your calendars for June 8th through 10th!) and my travel up to Colby College to work with the Jewish students there.

Don't worry. Despite all this traveling around you will still find me in the office or around Augusta most days, and I have plenty of time to meet with congregants, teach Hebrew School, and lead services and Torah study. I am grateful to all of you and our Temple board for the opportunity to engage in statewide and national work. This helps to bring the voices of small congregations to our national leaders and connects us more closely with our national organizations. For me, this is part of what is important about being part of a national movement. We are able to learn from others and have a say in what we do nationally. Perhaps most importantly, we can share with them all of the wonderful work we are doing.

Your Rabbi in Action!





Meditation has been a part of Jewish spiritual practice as far back as Talmudic times. We practice meditation because we value it as a spiritual practice and we do it in the context of the Jewish experience. We incorporate Jewish text, language, and intention, for that touches our souls. For us it is a method for waking up, for developing more precise awareness of our inner and outer lives from moment to moment. It is a practice that connects the inner self with the outer world in a more direct manner, creating a deeper sense of interpersonal relationship and a more intimate link to the physical world. It helps to develop and sustain a sense of the oneness of all Creation and a connection with God.

We will sit in community in silence. Meditators with a wide variety of experiences, practices and approaches are welcome and will come together seeking the collective support and good energy of sitting together.



Shabbat in the Wild Saturday, February 3rd @ 10:30am Shabbat Shira 5778

Join Susan Bakaley and Chris Marshall in the Montville countryside on February 3rd at 10:30 am for our 16th annual "Shabbat in the Wild." At this time of deepest cold and dark, a spark of life is stirring in the roots of trees although growth hasn't yet begun. Trees can teach us about this hidden "inkling" that precedes all creating, showing us how our own inner spark can grow and flourish.

We are celebrating Shabbat Shira, the crossing of the Sea of Reeds in to liberation, and Tu B'Shvat, the birthday of the trees. We'll start indoors in a circular yurt. Then, take our prayers outdoors along moderate trails, stopping at particular points to chant, offer readings, and share with each other.

Dress for the weather, wearing boots and layers. Bring warm hats, gloves or mittens, birdseed or breadcrumbs, and snow shoes, if you have them. Skis don't work well on these trails.

Beth El in Action Tackles Diversity in Education

Last spring, members of our community led meetings to get a sense from Temple Beth El members what they cared about in their local community. The creation of Temple Beth El In Action has been an inspiring process. With a great deal of feedback, our group has decided to put our energy into the issue of Diversity in Education. We have held several meetings to help us narrow down our focus and have decided to focus our efforts on encouraging school districts to:

• embrace a multicultural district wide calendar that adds Jewish and Muslim holidays to the already listed Christian holidays

- create a reasonable make-up policy for tests scheduled on holidays
- commit to not schedule major school events, such as homecoming, parent-teacher conferences, or school concerts on major Jewish and Muslim holidays
- have an attendance policy that does not penalize students for missing school due to holidays

We will advocate with our Muslim neighbors to ensure that their background is respected, such as not making students sit in the cafeteria when they are fasting during Ramadan. Our hope is to have an impact locally starting in Augusta, Winthrop, and RSU 2 and then to look to statewide action. At this stage, we are building partnerships with lay leaders and clergy from area congregations to build a broad coalition. We are working to learn more about what policies already exist in the school districts and will meet with local school board members to discuss our proposal. The Jewish community in Brunswick has been successful with implementing some of these changes, and we are following their ideas and trusting their feedback. An important aspect of this is reminding our group to keep our advocacy positive. Adding Jewish and Muslim holidays to the calendar does not detract from the holidays that are already on there. Our message is that these changes are about building a stronger, more diverse community that is focused on strong families and supporting our neighbors. Our team is working hard to reach these goals.

What can you do to be involved?

• Do you know someone on the school board in Winthrop, Augusta, or RSU 2 (Farmdingdale, Monmouth, Dresden, Richmond and Hallowell)? If so, let us know. We would love to have you set up a meeting with them.

• Do you have a recent story about how a school scheduled an event (field trip, back to school night, concert, etc) on a Jewish holiday? Let us know. We are looking for people to share their stories.

• Do you know someone outside of TBE who would be interested in this issue? Let us know. We are looking for people to join us.

• Join us Monday, January 15th from 6:30 to 8:00pm at TBE as we finalize our proposal and discuss how we will approach local school boards.




