From the desk of Rabbi Asch...

Greeter Community Helps Make TBE More Welcoming

TBE could not be the warm and welcoming place it is without our greeters! Before the first member of the congregation arrives, we adjust the thermostat; make sure the phone security system is charged and ready; and arrange seating, windows, lighting, prayer books, handouts, candles, food, and more. And then we open the door, but carefully. We make sure that folks entering belong with us, maintain a greeter log for newcomers, and gently encourage the wearing of name tags or of signing in. Once services or programming begins, we sit with half an eye on the door to welcome late arrivals. We are trained to handle emergencies. And when it is all over, we clean up. In other words, we seamlessly combine welcome, comfort, and safety. Pretty impressive, I say!

I only began coordinating the greeting schedule this past May, so this year's High Holiday season was my first real test. Deb Sewall, Rabbi Asch, and Dawn all provided suggestions, support, and encouragement. And despite a hurricane disrupting Rosh Hashanah services, it all went without a hitch. After Security Director Mike Drickey's very patient greeter training, I even tried my hand at greeting during the High Holidays and enjoyed the process. My plan is to sign up more often!

I want to extend a sincere thank you to our greeters for your commitment. All I need to do is let people know on a weekly basis where there are holes in the schedule and invariably, people come forward to fill them. It not only makes the scheduling process a pleasure but speaks to the quality and commitment of the TBE community as well. Come join us!

Wednesday, Dec. 13th: The Evolution of Hanukkah

Hanukkah is a minor holiday not even mentioned in the Torah. How did it get to be so popular? We'll look at ancient descriptions of the holiday and discuss how it evolved into its modern form. Along the way we'll discuss Jewish immigration to America, early Zionism and more. Bring your hanukkiah for our communal candle lighting; this session occurs on Hanukkah!

Take a minute. Close your eyes. Think of seven blessings in your life. Create this menorah of thankfulness. Whenever you say modim anahnu lah or light the Sabbath candles or have a spare



moment, recite the blessings on your menorah of thankfulness"

Students spend a week discussing what they were thankful for and going deeper. For example, food not only gives us sustenance, but allow us to gather together in community. Our five senses help us experience the world in new and different ways. They then spent a week constructing their menorah and sharing their thinking with one another.

We love that our Hebrew School is a place of community, learning an exploration and we always welcome new students to our school!
