From the desk of Rabbi Asch...

When I work with people who are looking to become Jewish, I tell them that part of their journey is being a regular presence at TBE. I also explain that in general we have people in our congregation who prefer Friday night services and those who prefer Saturday morning Torah study. While there are some dedicated members who show up to everything, some are drawn more to praying and some to study. I could also add that some are drawn more to book club, and some to post carding parties; some are always at Hebrew School on Sunday mornings, and some people volunteer in the community with other members from TBE.

It is natural that we tend towards activities we enjoy, and I'm glad we offer so many ways to be involved at the Temple. At the same time, I enjoy it when we can bring disparate groups together. That is one of the reasons I love this time of year. The holidays bring our whole community together.

I invite you to take advantage of that opportunity by not only greeting new friends, but by meeting someone new. Additionally, I hope you will make time to join us for one (or both!) of the talks by our Hannaford Scholar in Residence, Rabbi Geoffrey Mitleman, and later for sukkah decorating and Sukkot. Our celebrations will be enhanced by our new landscaping and pavilion behind the Temple.

Community, or *kehillah*, is a central value in Judaism. It is significant that we are called *am Yisrael*, the people of Israel, reminding us of our obligations to one another. In Pirkei Avot 2:4 Hillel warns us, "Do not separate yourself from the community." Ovadiah Bartenura (1445-1515), an Italian rabbi who later settled in Jerusalem, teaches that not separating oneself means that one has to share in the troubles of the congregation. But I think it means that we also have to share in the joys. These next two months provide us an opportunity to do just that.

In-Person Services



Goodbye, Parkersburg, West Virginia, Jews A moderately true story, with some liberties.

I recently attended an unveiling for my childhood and lifelong friend, Lynn, in my hometown of Parkersburg, WV, a town of about 40,00 people, the third largest city in West Virginia. Lynn and I were raised in Parkersburg and were a part of its very active Jewish community. Lynn was buried in a family plot in Parkersburg, even though she had not been a resident of Parkersburg for more than 50 years. The recent unveiling and get-together afterwards were a wonderful reunion of Lynn's children, grandchildren, brothers, and other extended family members. All of these people were from away. None of them were local. I was there, from Maine.

Only two Jewish residents of Parkersburg attended, Doug and Myla, who were of my generation. Doug and I were in high school together, and he and Myla were still residents of Parkersburg.

Why, you ask, did so few Parkersburg Jews attend this event? The answer is: Doug and Myla were the ONLY Jewish residents of Parkersburg, WV. And, they are in the process of selling their home and moving out-of-state to be near their children and grandchildren. As of this October 2025, there will be, to the best of my knowledge, no Jews in Parkersburg, WV. None, zero.

What happened?

I left Parkersburg in 1964, after my sophomore year in college. My family was part of Temple B'nai Israel, which had a small congregation, about 50 families. and was active.

In 1950, when I six years old, the Jews built Temple B'nai Israel. Services were held every other Friday, conducted by a Rabbinical student from Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, four hours away. The community could not afford a Rabbi. The student Rabbis took the train from Cincinnati to Parkersburg, stayed the weekend, doing Friday services, working with the Youth Group, and participating in Sunday school.

Friday night services were well attended, twenty-five or more people. The attendees were my parents, and the parents of the other children of my generation. We all attended Sunday School and continued there until confirmation, at about age 16. As high schoolers, we were part of the Temple youth group (National Federation of Temple Youth, locally the Ohio Valley Federation of Temple Youth). Our youth group had approximately 20 members. We attended conclaves around the state, weekends with other WV youth groups, events which were mostly social, and a lot of fun. The holidays and life cycle events were actively attended. We, our parents and some grandparents were there.

Our generation's parents were a close-knit social community. Their social friends were each other. Many weekends we shared meals at the home of Jewish friends of my parents, or at our home. My parents' closest friends and social circle was almost all Parkersburg Jews.

The Jewish community had very few persons educated beyond high school. One banker, one pharmacist, one doctor and one manufacturing professional. There were

quite a few Jewish-owned retail businesses: two shoe stores, three clothing stores, two furniture stores, all owned by Jews, who employed other Jews, as a part of their workforce. Virtually all of these Jews, I believe, did not go to college. Some of them may have had high school diplomas. My father did not.

As the years passed, the Jewish community's population got smaller. Every member of my youth group graduated from high school and went to college, and like me, did not return to Parkersburg (xcept for one or two who returned to run family-owned business). As time went by, more and more of our parents' generation passed away and moved to the Jewish section of Mt. Olivet Cemetery. My Jewish peers and I, nonresidents, saw each other in Parkersburg, mostly at funerals.

The decline of the Jewish population resulted in, approximately fifteen years ago, the closing and sale of the Temple.

At Lynn's unveiling in August 2024, I saw and spoke with Doug and Myla, the last Jews in Parkersburg. They ended up being the holders of the records of Temple B'nai Israel and the Jewish community. Once they decided to move away, a search was conducted to find a home for these records. Ultimately, the Temple in Charleston, West Virginia, accepted and has become the keeper of those records.

The disappearance of the Jewish community is notable and thought-provoking to me. Why are there no Jews in this town? Why didn't my generation return to Parkersburg and continue the existence of this once very active community? In order to try to answer these questions, I had two options: to research or to speculate. I have chosen the second option. And here are the answers.

Why are there no Jews in Parkersburg? There might be some Jews there who have not made their presence known. My peers did not come back to Parkersburg after being educated. If we had come back and had children and grandchildren, there would be Jews in Parkersburg. I can't think of any reason why other Jews did not move to Parkersburg.

Why didn't we, who left Parkersburg for our education, return? We didn't hate it. We did not have to escape it due to overt antisemitism. Ultimately, I think we did not return because we were fulfilling our parents' aspirations for us. Our parents were mostly second-generation Americans who had some but not a lot of education. And there was no doubt whatsoever that each of us was going to graduate from high school and go to college. It didn't even need to be discussed. There was not a glimmer of thought that staying home and not going to college was an option. Education was not important, it was essential, and mandatory.

So, we did what was expected of us. We went to college, many of us to post-graduate education. Then we followed personal and career opportunities consistent with our credentials. We scattered all over the country. Arizona, California, Ohio, Utah, Illinois, New York, Michigan, Massachusetts, Virginia, Florida, and Maine, an incomplete list. We became lawyers, nurses, doctors, bankers, actors, physical therapists, music producers, teachers. We married, we had partnerships, we had children. This, I believe, was hoped-for by our parents, this was central to their lives. I speculate that these results were the source of great pride and satisfaction. These results are the symbols of success by our parents. I hope that we are sufficiently grateful to our parents for having those aspirations. We should be.

I never thought that my generation's departure would reduce the size or significance of the Parkersburg Jewish Community. And now, when I think about it, I speculate that our parents did understand that might occur. And they were willing to accept that as part of the price of having us meet their aspirations. Those aspirations. What could be more Jewish than that?
