

From the desk of Rabbi Asch...

As you probably know from reading our weekly emails, the Cohen Center at Brandeis University recently released a study of Maine's Jewish population. This study interests me not only because I love math and data, but also because it provides a fascinating window into our community. Click this link to delve into the data on your own. Below, I want to share a few highlights with you, as well as some questions that the information raises.



First, just 24% of Jews in Maine are members of synagogues. That surprised me, probably because I live in the world of a synagogue. Why do so many Maine Jews not belong to a synagogue? The top two reasons are distance and lack of Jewish knowledge. At TBE, we would love to reach those people who are not yet part of our community. We already offer Shabbat and holiday services as well as Torah study on Zoom so that those who live far from TBE can participate.

But we want to do more to lower barriers to entry and we need your help. Please reach out to your friends who might be interested in attending TBE. Invite them to come with you or put them in touch with me so I can meet them. We also plan to do more events in the community. This month, for example, we'll be hosting *havdallah* on Old Hallowell Day, just before the fireworks. Please come by and bring a friend as well.

Bringing new members into the TBE community isn't just about numbers. Our tradition reminds us that each person is unique and has different needs. This summer, we've been working our way

through the book of Numbers. As the English name suggests, the book begins with an exhaustive counting of all of the tribes of the Israelites. Why does the Torah spend so much time with the exhaustive listing of these names? It teaches us that every person in a community is valuable.

Every person matters and every person is unique. The rabbis teach that in the *Avot v'imahot* we say, "God of Abraham, God of Isaac and God of Jacob," instead of "God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob" because each patriarch is unique and had a different relationship with God.

As a community we can provide people with stimulating learning, meaningful community, and even a bit of fun. I hope we can reach out to more people so that we can help to provide more meaning for them. I look forward to engaging in this work with you and the board in the year to come.

I wanted to share a quick breakdown of the financials for the outdoor project. Total costs: \$140,298 on the construction and landscaping \$4,313 on the furniture and outdoor signage

TOTAL COST = \$144,612

Total raised:

\$141,565 for the construction phase \$4,244 for the furniture phase

TOTAL RAISED = \$145,809

This means that we ended this project with a surplus of **\$1,197!** Thank you all for supporting this project!

Lastly, the two people that we could not do this without. Our office manager, Dawn Fecteau, goes above and beyond and always does it with a smile. And Rabbi Asch. We could not have asked for a better spiritual leader for our community. Our membership is growing because of Rabbi Asch, and our congregation continues to thrive because of her dedication.

Lastly, I wanted to thank you all for your commitment to *terumah* and encourage you to continue that support. From what I can tell, Temple Beth El will continue to flourish and remain the cornerstone of our Jewish community in Central Maine for many years to come.

Security Committee Update

Your security committee is working diligently to ensure that TBE remains a safe and welcoming place to worship and enjoy community. TBE is in the process of receiving a grant and consultation about security from Combined Jewish Philanthropies of Boston, which works with synagogues and Jewish community centers across New England. CJP staff will be on site at TBE this summer to provide a 2-hour training on situational awareness and de-escalation techniques. **All are invited to join us on Wednesday, August 20th from 5:30-7:30pm**. This training is open to the entire TBE community. In addition to this vital information, they will also provide food, so keep an eye out for further information and bring your appetite!

We continue to update our procedures as necessary and as changes dictate, including, for example, how to provide security and greeting at outdoor events held in our new gazebo. We monitor anti-Semitic activities across the US to ensure that our safeguards are adequate. We work closely with the Augusta Police Department who have been a supportive partner in these efforts. We coordinate the provision of first aid training in case of medical emergencies during events. And most importantly, we coordinate a schedule of volunteers who provide security, greeting, and setting up and cleaning up for all events held at the synagogue.

I want to extend a sincere thank you to our greeters for their commitment. All of these wonderful events could not happen without them! If you attended the Annual Meeting, you heard how fast our congregation is growing and you heard Rabbi Asch give an impassioned plea for more volunteers. Increased membership provides the potential for more functions and events. We need more people to volunteer so that we can grow as a congregation and as a community.

Our priority for new volunteers is to expand the group of people who do the set up and clean up. No training is necessary. This role involves setting up chairs, prayer books, food, etc. and putting everything away afterwards. People always help with cleaning up but the setting up part involves getting to TBE 15-20 minutes early (along with security and greeters) so that everything is ready for when people arrive and the event starts.

Three TBE B'nai Mitzvah Coming Up—Join Us!

This summer, three of our wonderful TBE Hebrew school students, Elliott Gilg, Aaron Asch, and Penny Frus, will celebrate their B'Mitzvah. Each will take a shot at explaining and exploring the ideas of Deuteronomy. We hope you will join us for each of these services.

In our class this year we decided to study the Torah in reverse; in some sense, it made sense. After all, we knew of our upcoming B'nai Mitzvah services, and we all know how the end of anything is often not reached or is given short shrift. We do not always have to start our explorations from the beginning.

Really, I don't know if this was the best approach, but it was interesting and seemed to often raise the question of why/what happened before? Of course, we ran out of time – the Torah is quite long and arduous whether you go forward or backward. But we at least made it through Deuteronomy.

When starting at the end we can ask, is there really an end?

It seems to me that central to Deuteronomy are Moses' speeches to the younger generation, knowing that he is about to die. There will be much that comes after the end of his life and yet what came before very much needs to be told. In this light, with the idea that what came before also lives on even in contemporary life, it seemed correct to start our study of Deuteronomy with Dr King's speech, "I've Been to the Mountain Top," which he delivered in Memphis, the evening before his assassination. King, like Moses, had reached the mountaintop. He said: "Like anybody I would like to live a long long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over . And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight, that we, as a people, will get to the promised land..." From that point we worked backwards and struggled with many of the big questions.

And so, on **August 16** please join **Elliott Gilg** as he becomes our first Bar Mitzvah of the summer and discusses parashat Ekev and Moses' memory of the incident of the golden calf. Then join us again the next week, **August 23**, as **Aaron Asch** becomes this August's second Bar Mitzvah. Aaron's parashat is Re'eh and he will be discussing the pilgrimage holidays. Finally, **Penny Frus** will celebrate her Bat Mitzvah on **September 6**. We hope you can come to TBE to hear Penny discuss parashat Ki Tetse, including Moses' exhortations for us to lead an ethical life.

Penny, Aaron, and Elliot are three extraordinary young people who can help us with our summer reflections. I hope you will be able to join them to celebrate their B'nai Mitzvah.
